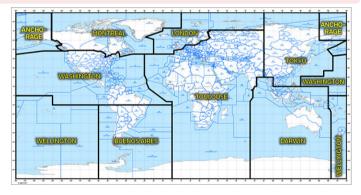

Problem with particles released during eruptions

Large amounts of ash and SO2 are released during volcanic eruptions. The crossing of a plume poses a particular threat to aircraft.

Role of VAAC

Météo France is responsible for one VAAC. Its purpose is to predict in near real time the transport of volcanic plumes (ash and SO2) and allow aircraft pilots to avoid them.



MOCAGE

MOCAGE is an operational CTM allowing to forecast the composition of the atmosphere on both global and regional domains.

Operation of the Toulouse VAAC

A simplified version of the CTM MOCAGE is run to predict ash dispersion. For now, SO2 satellite observations are only used by the forecasters to monitor and nowcast the behaviour of volcanic SO2 plumes.

Objectives

Assimilate volcanic SO2 total column product from different satellites (TROPOMI and IASI) and study the improvment of the forecast initialized by assimilation outputs.

Model configuration in this study

Global domain with a 1° resolution Hourly meteorological forcing provided by ARPEGE model Hourly 3D-VAR 3 simulations:

- assimilation of TROPOMI SO2 total column product distributed by Eumetsat
- assimilation of IASI SO2 total column product available in Aeris database
- assimilation of observations from both instruments

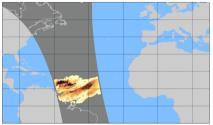
Validation with OMI observations

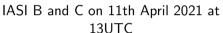
La Soufrière Saint Vincent eruption - 11th April 2021

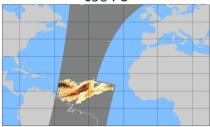
Several explosions between the 9th and the 12th April 2021. SO2 plume crossed the Atlantic Ocean and reached Africa.

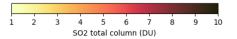
SO2 total column observed by:

TROPOMI on 11th April 2021 at 16UTC



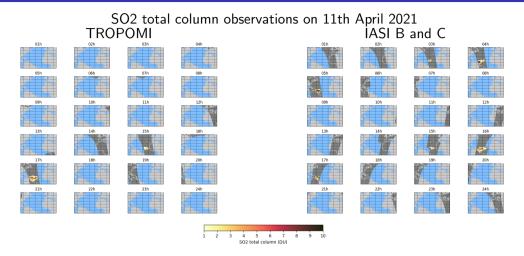

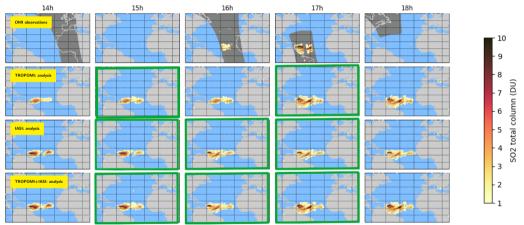
La Soufrière Saint Vincent eruption - 11th April 2021



Tropomi passes over the plume only once a day whereas IASI passes over the plume twice a day

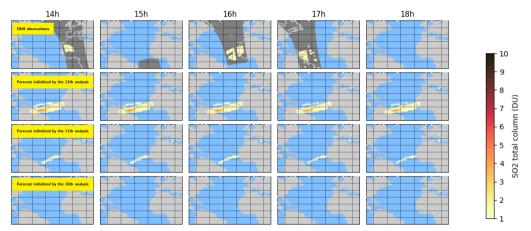

IASI and TROPOMI complement each other. Moreover, structures modelized thanks to the assimilation are observed by OMI.

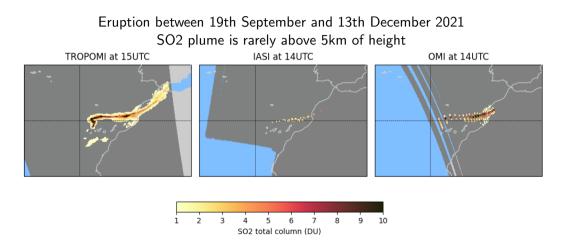
La Soufrière Saint Vincent eruption - Forecast initialized by TROPOMI and IASI data assimilation outputs for the 13th April 2021



Maps represent SO2 total column forecasts at different terms for the 13th April 2021. Assimilating volcanic SO2 total columns improves forecasts in short term.

When SO2 plume is under 5km, IASI has some difficulties to observe SO2 total column

Conclusion

- Assimilating SO2 total column in MOCAGE is very useful for the users of the Toulouse VAAC.
- Assimilation of SO2 total column allows to improve forecasts in short term.
- Assimilating data provided by IASI allows to correct more often the modelized plume. Nevertheless, IASI has some difficulties to observe SO2 total column for a plume under 5km of altitude.
- Assimilating data provided by TROPOMI allows to correct the modelized plume once a day but it is modelized even if the SO2 plume is under 5km.
- Assimilating data from both instruments allows to correct the modelized plume at least once a day.

Soon operational

TROPOMI SO2 assimilation should become operational in November 2022.

Perspectives

- Assimilating data provided by other satellites. The best option would be to assimilate data provided by geostanionary satellites.
- Use information on SO2 plume heights. This information is already available for IASI and TROPOMI.

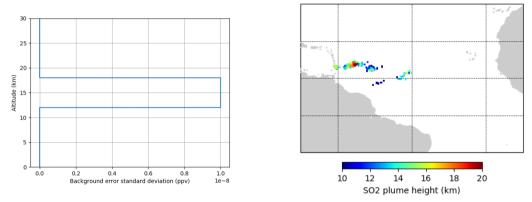

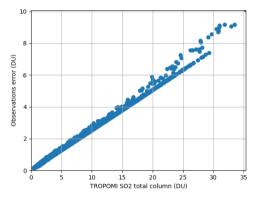

Choice of the background error matrix



Background error covariance is a profile containing strong values between 12 and 18km. Tropomi Layer Height shows a SO2 plume at this height.

Choice of the observation error matrix



Observation error is directly read in the Tropomi files. Uncertainties are around 25%.

Observations error (DU) 2 10 20 з'n 40 50 60 lasi SO2 total column (DU) For lasi assimilation, we use 15% of the observations as obervation errors.
