

What is the real benefit of assimilating IASI within the Météo-France global model ARPEGE?

1. Introduction

4. Impact of the IASI Channels on the forecast skill

Instruments (imagers, sounders, or radar) on board satellites are nowadays the most important data providers to build the initial conditions of NWP models. Among these, infrared hyperspectral sounders on board polar orbiting satellites, such as IASI or CrIS, provide information on temperature and moisture profiles with good precision and good vertical resolution. Among many channels available on this type of instruments, those assimilated for NWP are channels sensitive to different parameters, such as temperature, water vapour or ozone.

For IASI up to 129 channels (Figure 1) are assimilated over sea in clear sky conditions from Metop B and C (Figure 2). They consist of 99 temperature channels, 4 window channels, 5 ozone and 21 WV channels. Over land the surface temperature is retrieved by inverting the radiative transfer equation with channel 1194 (945 cm⁻¹). Only clear channels are assimilated and they are detected with the McNally and Watts (2003) cloud detection scheme. They are bias corrected with the variational bias correction (Auligné et al, 2007). The inter-channel correlation of the observation errors are taken into account using a Desroziers diagnostic (Desroziers 2005).

In this poster, we present the results of an OSE concerning the observation system used at Météo-France and the results are focussed on the IASI interferometer. The second point is the impact of changing the correlated R matrix for IASI and CrIS in the assimilation.

2. Observing System Experiments

An OSE (Observation System Experiment) type study (Chambon et al. 2022) has been conducted to determine the relative importance of each observing system used at Météo-France and of the IASI instrument (among other observations) in the quality of the forecast for the global model ARPEGE, measured by objective scores.

- Denial experiments in which an observation system is removed from the data assimilation.
- All experiments conducted with lower resolution (T798) than operational one
- 6 months 1 October 2019 31 March 2020
- Experiments:
- NO IR (no IASI, CRIS, AIRS and GEO radiances)
- NO MW (No AMSUA MHS ATMS SSMIS GMI SAPHIR MWHS2
- NO CONV (no radiosonde, aircraft, wind profilers and surface observation)
- NO SCATT (no observation from scatterometers)
- NO GNSS (no GNSS Radio Occultation data)
- NO AMV (no Atmospheric Motion vectors)
- NO IASI
- Verification Analysis of IFS and comparison of the different experiments forecast scores



IASI brings more than half of the impact of the IR sounders. Due to the presence of clouds, the impact is reduced in the low troposphere (Figure 5). Temperature channels are beneficial for temperature up to 84 h forecast range and Water vapour channels for humidity even if the impact lasts less time (up 60 h).

The denial experiments with respect to channels show that removing temperature channels is detrimental, removing water vapour channels is in general detrimental, removing ozone channels is detrimental for temperature but positive for the humidity (Figure 6).

The NO IASI experiment has been extended in three other denial experiments: the NO IASI T (in which the "temperature" channels" were removed from the assimilation), the NO IASI WV (for which the "water vapour channels" were removed from the assimilation) and the NO IASI O3 where the 5 "ozone channels" were removed.

3. Impact of Infrared Sounders and IASI

First the impact of each large observation group was evaluated (Figure 3). In the Northern Extra-tropics, the main contributor is the conventional observation for the three parameters (i.e. geopotential, temperature and humidity). For the two other regions, micro-wave and infrared data denial leads to the largest impact. For temperature at 850 hPa especially, the Infrared Sounders is the second contributor (in Northern Hemisphere) or the first one in Tropics and the southern Hemisphere. For the humidity, removing micro-wave data degrades the forecast the most in the southern hemisphere and in the tropics.

In tropical regions, the lack of IR radiances significantly degrades the temperature at 850 hPa with values slightly above 6 % during the first 24 hours. Conventional observations and infra-red sounders contribute similarly but to a lesser extent to forecast skill score reduction, except in the short-range at 12-h for temperature with a larger loss of around 9 % from NO IR.

5. Impact of an updated R matrix for IASI and CrIS

The inter-channel correlation matrix for the observation errors have been updated for cycle 48 according to the Desroziers et al (2005) method. The new correlation matrices are plotted in Figure 7 The impact of this modification on the forecast skill is weak but positive as shown by Figure 8 over Europe. It seems to impact mostly geopotential and wind. Positive impact on most regions of the globe are also found.

6. Conclusions and perspectives

- The OSE conducted at Météo-France show that Infra-red radiances also have a positive impact but which is less pronounced at longer ranges. Since they represent 80 % in terms of the number of observations, each individual radiance has a rather low information content compared to NO CONV and NO MW. IR data are dominated by the 3 IASI sounders in terms of observation quantity and observation impact.
- IASI has a large impact on the forecast, especially in the troposphere for temperature around 400 hPa and 800 hPa.
- Temperature channels from CO2 band are beneficial mostly for temperature forecast.
- Water vapour channels appear to be detrimental for the temperature forecast in the UTLS, requiring further investigation.
- Ozone channels seem to be detrimental for humidity near the surface.

Other experiments will be conducted to further understand the impact of the various IASI channel data sets.

The update of IASI and CrIS observations error correlation matrices slightly improve the forecast quality.
